### Dick and Christopher




Dick was brought to Molima back in October by Social Welfare. Tragically, his mother was run over by a bike and killed whilst she was selling food in the street.

She left behind four children, two of whom were too young for Wezi to take on and so have been returned to their extended family.

This is just another illustration of how hard life can be in Malawi, particularly when families are faced with such traumatic situations.

We were fortunate enough this year to gain first hand news from Billy Williamson, a member of the Norwich Dedza Partnership Team and friend of Jackie Last, who recently stood down as trustee.

Whilst visiting Dedza in Malawi, he took some gifts to the Molima Home and passed on our greetings to Wezi and the children.

We also benefitted from his many wonderful photos which he took during his visit.





Billy commented on the fact that the children seemed happy and that they appreciated the gifts.

He is going out to Malawi again next year and expressed his willingness to make another visit.



### Chair's Report

# Through all the problems Molima has had to cope with this year we have much to be thankful for.

Wezi, family, staff and children have generally been in good health. Malaria is a constant threat, particularly when the children go to visit their villages. Fortunately, this has not been an issue for us this year. There was also a surge of cholera earlier in the year affecting Lilongwe, Blantyre, Mangochi and Nkhata where schools had to close to stop infection spreading. Fortunately, the epidemic did not reach Dedza.

## Back in March Malawi saw their fair share of storm damage.

At this time Wezi told us they often had no signal and their communication was affected. Fortunately, Dedza suffered relatively lightly and their crops weren't affected.

## This year we have funded a cultivation programme, put together by Wezi.

This has included providing costs for the rental of seven acres of land, seeds, fertilisers, transport, as well as workers to plant and harvest the crops. This has proved to be the most costeffective way of coping with soaring inflation and ensuring that Molima has the means of being self-sufficient. Malawi has recently devalued its currency which is likely to cause a significant increase in prices -in a country which is already experiencing annual inflation of over 25% and food inflation of over 35%. The first rains have arrived in Dedza, and we join Wezi and her team in praying for more, sustained rain in the weeks ahead.

#### On an educational front...

It is also important to note that while the success of some of the children has enabled them to move on into Secondary School or into the next year group, others have struggled and have had to redo the year. Many children find this discouraging. Orfund has helped by providing the funding for part-time teachers in the holidays to help the children get through their exams but this is not a guaranteed solution.

## We've also seen success at different ends of the age spectrum.

You may remember Blessing from the front cover of last year's newsletter. Blessing was adopted earlier this year and is now enjoying a different kind of family life. And we have been celebrating the success of Molima's first graduate following Dickson's award of a BA in Journalism and media studies.

This summer, it was with great sadness that we said goodbye and thank you to two of our trustees, Jackie Last and Michelle Willshire.

Both Jackie and Michelle brought valuable expertise to the team through their social work backgrounds and had served Orfund diligently for nine years and two years respectively. Jackie and Michelle are both looking forward to spending more time with family in this next chapter and we wish them both well and very much hope they will continue to stay part of the Orfund family.

We continue to be tremendously grateful to all who support Molima financially, and especially those who give regularly by standing order.

I am always personally impacted by the stories of the young children who join Molima Home, and an influx of new admissions to Molima this year is a poignant reminder of the tremendous need there is for this work in Malawi.

Yet, covering the day-to-day costs of the Molima Home continues to be a real challenge, especially in the context of the high inflation mentioned earlier! How grateful I am for the six individuals who started supporting Molima financially on a monthly basis following our highly successful 'Malawi evening' in Poole. If it wasn't for this extra monthly income, Orfund would be operating at a significant deficit this year.

As costs continue to rocket in Malawi, I would humbly ask all our sponsors to consider again if they are able to increase there monthly giving. A few extra pounds each month goes a long way in Malawi!

£250 - special meal and gifts for children and staff at Christmas

Total expenditure in 2023 on Molima will be £16942
